his fall was one season we didn't have to worry about evacuating dogs. The rains were heavy and not too cold, and we're pleased to be spared fire danger for at least another year. A new volunteer, who asks not to be named, has taken on the role of Supply Sergeant, calling on hotels and businesses to donate anything they don't need that could possibly help us. As a result, all the dogs have nice fluffy sheets and blankets in their houses, with fresh new spares readily available.

An excellent dog trainer known to us, Cesar Millan, now has his own television show called "Dog Whisperer." It airs on the National Geographic Channel three times a day. We highly recommend that any of you who can make time available to view this program do so. His techniques have been found by us and countless others to be highly successful, and, particularly with dominant breed dogs like Dobermans, it is important to be the "pack leader." Cesar undeniably establishes himself in this role with every dog he works with. The results speak for themselves.

Our webmaster, Susan Schionning, has moved to her new property in rural Tehachapi and applied for her own non-profit dog rescue called Doberman Pinscher SOS. Her emphasis is on senior and special-needs Dobermans (and a few Rottweilers). She has her fencing completed and has taken a few of our difficult cases already. The dogs in her care are long-termers or dogs with little hope of being adopted who have "quality of life" at Susan's (they get to sleep indoors, etc.) But...she has had enormous start-up costs and is reaching out for support to anyone who can help. If you can help, please return the donation form on page 7 with your check marked "SOS" in the lower left-hand corner. Your check should still be payable to Dobie Rescue or Doberman Pinscher Rescue so that you can receive the tax deduction, but we will make the funds available to Susan.

WAITING FOR HOMES

It's always difficult deciding which of our dozens of deserving dogs to feature in our newsletters, so you can bet that the dogs we do showcase this way are really special!

RICKY

is a great little Terrier mix. He's about 5

years old and weighs just over 15 pounds. Ricky has a slight underbite, which gives him a particularly endearing face, but the most endearing thing about Ricky is his charming



way of asking for attention. He's never pushy, he just stands by wagging his tail, watching you, until you grant his wish.

CATRINA

is also 5 years old, probably a mixture of Spaniel and Chow Chow. She had been turned in to an animal shelter a few days before we went there to rescue a Doberman, and she was pointed out to us

by one of the kennel attendants, who said "she's so sweet, but she doesn't get noticed because she's calm and quiet and stays in the back." We liked that she was calm and quiet, as



she still is, and she's good with all the other dogs she's been kenneled with. Catrina weighs about 30 pounds and has a wonderful personality.

SASSY and CHELSEA

came from the same home. We placed Sassy five years ago (she's now 9) as a





companion for Chelsea (she's now 11), who had lost her companion shortly before. The owners decided to retire, sell their house, and travel the country in a motorhome. No, they didn't want to take a couple of senior canine ladies along. The dogs had been kept mostly outdoors, and Sassy has always been timid with men. Both dogs are sweet, in good condition, and we'd be delighted to place them individually or together.

DIEGO

is a nearly-purebred Chocolate Lab who is visually impaired at age 6-7 years. He

isn't completely blind, but he can't fetch a ball except by scent. His owner's husband left her and she had no idea where she would be living, a difficult enough problem for a person alone, much less



one with a large dog. Diego has always been an outdoor dog, and he loves water. He's so happy when someone plays with him!

INKY DINKY

is also visually impaired. He's a middle-aged Brussels Griffon mix, and he's quiet, gentle, and good with other dogs. We think older kids would be fine, too. He's a little guy (12



pounds or so) and just as cute as he looks.

Boss

is a large, solid boy, middleaged, with cropped ears that are passable. He came from a "rough



part of town," and had a huge wound that was scabbing over at the time we rescued him from the animal shelter. It is believed that he either had acid poured on his back, or perhaps gasoline, which was then ignited. A month after rescue, his scabs have fallen off and his back is healed. He's beginning to grow hair back on the affected areas. Boss became a favorite of ours with his mellow, happy demeanor. He is slightly furry, with a blockier head than many Dobermans have, so he may be a slight mix with Rottweiler.

Adoption Updates


Of the five dogs featured in our September newsletter, three were adopted. Lucky dogs!

without his tail, which always wagged gently at anyone's approach. He had the most wonderful personality, and he would literally greet you with a SMILE. Even in his most senior years, he would still play, for short periods, in cool weather.

Neither Ardis nor I ever expect to have or know a better dog. He was as close to perfect as either of us have known, and if there is a Heaven for animals, he's most certainly there. She once took him to a school for developmentally disabled kids, and little kids hung all over him. Jake took it all without complaint. He was so well housebroken that, on a couple of occasions when we forgot or he didn't ask to be let out, he waited 24 hours without having an accident.

He was originally found living under someone's house. They fed him until they could capture him, then called us, believing he was a


