

Some of you may recall that Marilyn was the one who obtained a court order to have a Dobie named Tripoli released to us, after he became aggressive from being tasered in a public park when he got loose from his owner.

A friend of Marilyn's picked Bucky up and drove him to Monterey. It didn't look good at first. Marilyn said Bucky had a 'tude with her other dog and was marking territory everywhere in her house. She planned to return him the next weekend, but...she didn't.

About a week later we called to find out his status, and she said they worked out all the wrinkles. (We wish everyone would do that!) After he was groomed, now looking all "foofy," her friends can't believe he's the same dog in his earlier picture. See the happy trio above.

TAIL-ER MADE!

As mentioned in our last newsletter, and probably quite a few before, Dobermans are very hard to place when they have undocked tails. There are two main reasons usually given: (1) the dog doesn't really look like a Doberman with a long tail; and (2) everything will be swept off the coffee table.

We do think you should have what you want in a Doberman, and we try to match all of our adopters with dogs that are as close to what they want as possible.

On the other hand, how about TWELVE good reasons to adopt a dog with a long tail?

- 1. The dog is spared the amputation surgery when he's just 3-4 days old;
- 2. He'll be much more comfortable sitting if his tail can lay to the side of his butt;
- 3. He'll look much less scary to kids and people who are afraid of Dobermans;
- 4. The long tail can act like a rudder, making it easier for him to swim;
- 5. It's much easier to tell if the dog is wagging his tail at you, viewed from the front;
- 6. It's also a much more visible signal to other dogs, indicating the dog is friendly;
- 7. You might be able to pass him off as a Pointer-Coonhound mix for insurance purposes;
- 8. There's more of him to love;
- 9. There's something to grab on to if he's about to dash into something forbidden;
- He can chase away flies with each sweep of his tail:
- 11. You'll have the knowledge that you avoided the needless suffering of having his tail amputated;
- 12. You'll also have the knowledge that you helped get an equally wonderful, but less adoptable, dog get adopted.

Don't the two reasons NOT to adopt a long-tailed Doberman pale in comparison to all of the good reasons to do so?

RAGS TO RICHES

We love to tell these kinds of stories! This one is about a dog named Dong Dong, a Border Collie mix we agreed to take from the shelter in Taiwan that we've written much about in the past: the fact that they have 1,300 dogs in 4' by 5' cages, where they spend 99% of their days and nights, and the fact that very few have any chance at all of being adopted in Taiwan. There is so little space for large dogs. The shelter, TUAPA, does an awesome job of caring for the animals and doing the outreach necessary to get as many as possible out of there and into situations where they can be adopted.

One of their rescue coordinators, Johanna Quinn, approached us about Dong Dong, realizing that we have a fondness for Border Collies. She said that in Taiwan, black dogs are considered bad luck, and those with white feet imply even more bad luck. They have virtually no chance of having any sort of quality life in Taiwan.

When Dong Dong arrived in Los Angeles, he looked shellshocked. His big round eyes showed a combination of wonderment, confusion, and terror. We put him in with a confident dog to help him learn, by example, how to cope with his new environment.

Gradually Dong Dong came to understand things better, such as what a leash is for, the fact that people can make you feel really good and give you treats, etc. Our dog-walkers that show up on weekends included Rhonda Scarborough of Oxnard, and something in Dong Dong's sweet lack of confidence clicked with her desire to help him be a happier dog. Imagine our surprise when she said she'd like to adopt him!

That wasn't the end of the surprises. A few months later, Rhonda e-mailed us to say that she hoped to have Cesar Millan, the amazing "Dog Whisperer," come to meet Dong Dong and provide his advice and expertise to help Dong Dong with his confidence.

Cesar came twice to Rhonda's home and two episodes were filmed there which will air some time around June. His staff also came here to the ranch to film a brief interview on how he came to be in the United States to begin with. Watch for this episode! If it hasn't yet aired by the time our June newsletter is sent, we'll provide the details.

Some of you shop for various things on line, so we thought you should know that you can also help your favorite charity (we hope it's us!) by joining iGive.com.
