

ADOPTION UPDATES

We're thrilled to report that three of the special-needs dogs featured in our last issue have been adopted!

JOEY,

the neurologically-impaired Dobie from Taiwan, was adopted by Tracy and Bill Beckham of Fresno, with plenty of persuasion from their twin daughters, Lainie and Rachel. This lovely family is shown in the photo below. It is a miracle that Joey

made the trip from a 4' x 5' cage across the ocean to a comfortable,



loving American home with four people giving him constant attention. Here's a quote from Bill's recent e-mail:

"Joey has completely come out of his shell. He runs and plays with the other dogs. He tears through the house with abandon. He is NOT a free feeder, as he eats everything in sight including the final pages of Tracy's books. He plays Doberman games with Snick like 'I've got your duck now, ha, ha, ha.' He has put on a few pounds. He smiles a lot. I would say that he is one very happy Doberman."

Bill says Joey was in heaven after getting a real bone, which he promptly chewed



down to the knuckle. He likes sleeping in bed between Bill and Tracy; that way he can't fall out of bed.

LOTTIE,

our skittish, almost-feral little Dobie girl, was adopted by Gail Peterson of Walnut Creek. Gail has disabilities which cause

her to be mostly housebound, so she felt she would be in a good position to work with Lottie, and she felt her other dog, Charlie,



would help. This is from her recent e-mail: "Lottie has come a long way in the two months she has been with Charlie and me. She still has months ahead of her in order to put her anxieties behind her, but she is working on them. She sleeps in my bedroom...she loves her walks...she loves Charlie and follows him everywhere. She just started going to the dog park, which she loves. She is adorable, and the neighborhood is very supportive of the work we are both doing to improve her life. In the early evening we (the three of us) have a love fest and she will come close to me when I pat the ground beside me. I think she will turn into a really great dog with all

of the love she is surrounded with. I can't wait!"

COCO,

our almost-senior wellbehaved Dobie girl with urinary incontinence, was adopted by Sandi of north Orange County (last name



and location withheld at her request). Before sending her off to Sandi's, we determined and provided the maintenance dosage of Proin for her, which controls incontinence in most dogs with this problem. It has worked remarkably well for her.

Sandi reports that Coco is a good fit for her in every way, except...she is social with cats only if they aren't afraid of her. She has three cats, with low, medium, and high fear levels. Coco is also a good age for Sandi, as Sandi is working into exercising slowly, after a couple of years of not doing so due to health issues. Everyone comments on how nice a dog she is, behaviorally and aesthetically. She is wonderful to walk, which was a major concern for Sandi. The bottom line is that Coco has a great home for life, providing she leaves the kitties alone (under close supervision).

WAITING FOR HOMES... SAD DOGS

Most of our dogs are not unhappy to spend time here. They may not get to watch TV while sitting on a comfy couch with a doting owner, but there is always something going on, so they are stimulated, have plenty to eat and drink, and those that can live with another dog get to do so. We think many of our long-term residents have a much better life than those unfortunate creatures that spend their whole lives in someone's back yard with nothing to do.

Despite that, we have a few dogs at any given time that are not happy. We call these our "sad dogs," and our hearts break for them every time we see them. Though we try to make sure they get walked often, it's still just an occasional thing that breaks the monotony of being incarcerated. Often they are the dogs that aren't the most adoptable for one reason or another.

Just in case there is a home waiting for one of our sad dogs, we wanted to tell their stories here.

FIDNA

is a 25-pound Spaniel-Border Collie type that we placed quite a few years ago and got

back in April, 2008, for nipping men without apparent provocation. She is 9 years old now, but she's good in many ways: housebroken, knows commands, isn't destructive, isn't a digger,



is a very good watchdog. Fiona is a quiet dog who just needs a comfortable place to keep a lonely person company. Her patient gaze is heartbreaking.

ELECTRA

doesn't have a known history, as she was

a shelter rescue. She is 6 or 7 years old, quiet, and lives compatibly with a large male dog companion. She is tall and fairly attractive, though she has become somewhat frail in appearance in the six months she has been with us, due largely to some deterioration in muscle tone. We give her as much



exercise in our playground as possible, but she is prone to simply lying by the gate, waiting. Electra will need a little time to bond with a new owner; we think she still misses someone.

MAURICE

is a small, friendly Rat Terrier-type guy who was what we call a "Fillmore street stray." He had been lost for a length of time before being brought to us, but

ADOBES FOR ADOPTION!

Any of you who have visited us in the last eight to ten years have seen our adobe kennels, 84-square-foot fiberglass doghouses that we hoped would be perfect kennels for our dogs. We had 18 of them built, with one-half of each one covered, with a skylight, and the other half open to the sky for fresh air. Unfortunately, they haven't worked out quite as we had hoped. Some of the dogs chew the fiberglass, which, if ingested, could cause perforation of intestines. The drainage didn't work out as we hoped either, and some of them



become overheated in the summer months.

In short, we are seeking to remove most of them. If you have a use for any of these structures, most of which are still reasonably sound structurally, please let us know. They are "free to a good home," just requiring disassembly and transportation out of here.
