

lost her happy home when her owners passed away. She had been living with six other Chihuahuas and two Dobermans.



we had arranged for her became unavailable. Poor Samantha just needs a warm, comfy bed and a way to get outside




to relieve herself. At ten years old or so, she sleeps most of the time and is very, very quiet.

for hand-shakes and "high fives." One day a male visitor asked to go into his





MEDICAL MATTERS

Fortunately, this column will be important to only a few of our readers, but to those readers, it may be very important indeed. The readers we are targeting are those who know what the term "Lick Granuloma" means.

This condition is common in Dobermans and other large breeds, particularly those with short hair. The cause is usually not known even to the dog's owner, but the result is a sore area, usually on the dog's foot or leg, which the dog constantly licks. This leads to a wound which

can't heal, and ultimately to infection.

I have often made the statement that, if anyone could find a CURE for this condition, they would make a fortune. We have tried so many things over the years, including e-collars, cervical collars, bandages, medications such as Clomicalm, various antibiotics, sedatives, skin and coat supplements, changes of diet, and even sheet metal sleeves which we have wired to the dogs' collars so they couldn't remove the sleeves. For some dogs, none of these things worked.

One such dog is a lovable red male Dobie, an older boy named Mino, who was given up by his owner when he moved. When we picked Mino up, he had a bandage on his lower leg, and the owner said he had a sore there. Little did we know. An hour later, Mino had stripped off the bandage and never left the leg alone again...for years. He even began working on the other rear

leg.

Finally, we found the solution for this dog. It is presented here with the hope that it may help a few other dogs with this problem, though we don't claim it will work for every one. First, we put a hardy e-collar on Mino, high up on his neck, right behind the ears, and secured it to his nylon collar snugly. Then, behind it, a cervical collar. The cervical collar prevents the e-collar

from being maneuvered lower on the neck, and the combination makes it impossible (for Mino, at least) to either reach his leg up to his face, or

to bend his neck around to reach his leg. Here is a picture of Mino wearing his fix-it ensemble.

The more determined a dog is to perpetuate this obsessive-



compulsive behavior, the more you will need to make sure he can't destroy the e-collar. We found that liberal use of duct tape is quite useful. Good luck, and let us know your results!


