new owner down. Kitty is a red Dobie weighing about 75 pounds, and she is housebroken, great with nearly all other dogs. She's waiting for a chance at a permanent home!

Who Says Dobie Rescue Only Saves Dobermans?


he tiny dog in this photo is "MABEL," probably a mixture of Shelty and Chihuahua. She is about 10 years old and blind in one eye, but she is lovable and gets along with everything! Can you make room for a ten-pound bundle of love?



"GENTRY" (sony, no photo) was first discovered at the pound, wide-eyed and frightened, his front legs nearly tom off by pit bulls. He had been treated at an emergency vet clinic and had tubes and drains protruding from his elbows and armpits. The pound recommended no adoption on this dog, but his eyes said he wanted to live. He was thin, had not been vaccinated due to his condition, and was covered with ticks. Would he live?

Dobie Rescue rehabilitated Gentry over a two-month period, and now he is ready for adoption to a gentle family where he would be the only dog. He is a cropped 3-year-old red male weighing approximately 85 pounds, and he is polite and obedient.

his wonderful young German Shepherd is "HANS". Either through birth defect or injury, Hans' head and jaw are misshapen, giving him the appearance of being slightly tipsy and winking at the camera. He is extremely social, both with people and other dogs, and has absolutely no bad habits that we are aware of.





or reasons unknown to us, "SMOKY" has been at our rescue facility for over three years, waiting for his own home. He is a blue male with a good coat, and we believe he is




housebroken and well-mannered. Smoky is now about 8 years old, and he can tolerate most female dogs.

"RISKY" is an older female who is one of the longest-residing Dobies at our facility. By her general demeanor around people, she is accustomed to taking commands and being adored and protective. Because she is not the prettiest Dobie at our facility, she gets overlooked month after month. Risky is now about 8 years old, and probably should be the only dog in her family



Finder System


very dog leaves Doberman Pinscher Rescue with an I.D. tag bearing our address and phone number. The tags are numbered, so that if one of these dogs becomes lost, the finder can call us and we know which dog has been found by the I.D. tag number. We can then call you at your home or work phone number and tell you where the dog is.

A new improvement to this system has made it better than ever. We are now reachable by beeper 24 hours a day. This can potentially mean you can have your lost pet back in minutes!


You have two important responsibilities to make this system work. The first is to keep the tag on your dog at all times. If the tag becomes lost, notify us immediately so that we may replace it with a new one. Secondly, be sure to notify us of any change of address and home and work phone numbers so that we can keep our files current. The safety of your dog may depend on it!

he dog pictured here was a wonderful dog who came into our rescue facility about one year ago. We named him "HAPPY." He was a 5-month-old red male Dobie, gawky and adorable, when he was rescued from the pound with a moderate upper respiratory infection.

Despite proper vet care and medication, his illness quickly escalated into pneumonia.

After many weeks of no improvement, Happy was transferred to Dobie Heaven, the Doberman rescue facility in Clovis, California, near Fresno. Betty Cochran, who established Dobie Heaven, is a wonderfully caring woman who works for two vets and is well qualified to handle difficult medical cases,


Under her care, Happy made gradual improvement over the many weeks he was there. When he finally appeared well enough, he was placed with a new adoptive family, the Morsers, of West Hills, California. Happy enjoyed a happy life with the Morsers, and they cherished him until his death three months later.

All who knew Happy were devastated by his death. The Morsers' autopsy results revealed that the lungs of this dog not yet one year old were so scarred and depleted that they appeared to belong to a very old dog.

Because of the prodigious medical treatment Happy required, and because he was so special that he deserves to always be remembered, we have established a special "Happy Memorial Fund." Donations earmarked for this fund will be used to help dogs with special medical problems. We'll tell you all about them in future issues of this newsletter.


