
Other dogs we told you about that are still available are (clockwise from top):

GOOD NEWS!



"JACK" and "JILL" are approximately 8-month old Dobies with natural ears and tails. They are beautiful and good-natured, but were apparently abused by their previous owner and are still frightened of <u>all</u> people, even the one that feeds them. They should probably be placed separately, but each with at least one other, more confident, dog.



"TRUFFLE" is a male Shih Tzu, about two years old, who arrived at our facility with a broken pelvis. He has now had over a month of cage rest and is using all four legs, but he shuffles considerably in his hind quarters due to temporary or permanent nerve damage. He's affectionate and quite social with other dogs.


From Cindy Lee of Summerland:

SEIZURE ALERT

Very exciting opportunity came our way last year. We were asked to choose a candidate to be trained for seizure response work. In much the same way that Retrievers are often used for seeing-eye dogs and Beagles for drug-sniffing work, it was determined that Dobermans, because of their enormous sensitivity and loyalty to their owners, would be a good choice for seizure alert work; namely, to detect and warn the owner of an imminent epileptic or other type of seizure and thus avoid the dangers of a surprise episode.

We chose a large female Dobie named Dawn to be trained using \$3,000. in grant money obtained for that purpose. Dawn had all of the right attributes: she was secure and well-adjusted, intelligent, calm, loyal, obedient, sensitive, and social with people and other animals. Plus, she was gorgeous -- a fine representative of her breed. Good P.R. for Dobies!

From Fillmore, Dawn was sent to Dobie Heaven rescue in Clovis, where Betty Cochran did some basic training with her before sending her to North Dakota for several months of intensive training.

Today Dawn is the constant companion of a 16-year-old girl named Cissy who operates on a 12-year-old level. She has had multiple disabilities from birth, ranging from epilepsy, asthma, migraines, and low immune system, to borderline mild mental retardation, severe learning disabilities, auditory memory and processing dysfunction, to arthritis, ankylosing spondylitis and fibromialgia. Everywhere she went, someone had to accompany her in case of a seizure, memory lapse, etc. There were times Cissy was a block from home and became completely lost.

After Dawn was trained, Cissy was taken to meet her new companion. The following is a portion of a letter written by Cissy's mother to the Great Plains Assistance Dogs Foundation, reprinted with permission from "The Foundation Chronicles," their newsletter:

"Dawn and Cissy bonded together almost immediately, and Cissy was able to control this 90 lb. animal with a quick snap of the leash and a steady command...Progress was made at such a rapid rate that even (the trainer) was surprised.

However, the ultimate joy came on a Wednesday night. Although having seizures can certainly not be called 'a joy,' Dawn's response surely could be. She began to respond to Cissy's 'different' state almost an hour before the seizure became apparent either to Cissy or myself. I will not go into detail, but suffice it to say Dawn alerted, on her own, not only Cissy, but me. Then she took it upon herself to keep Cissy on the floor in a sitting position until Dawn sensed the seizure was coming to an end. Before it was over, I found myself watching the dog for signals, not my daughter. Once the seizure was at an end, Dawn became her regular, relaxed self and I became one of the happiest people in the world."

Because of the marvelous sensitivity of her special Doberman, this young woman will be able to lead a much freer, more normal, life. And it all started with saving a good dog from the pound. Are we proud? You bet!

MEDICAL MATTERS

In our preceding issue we told you the heartbreaking story of "HAPPY," the wonderful young Dobie whose life was cut short by illness. Some of the funds donated to the Happy Memorial Fund by you, dear readers, helped make possible the rehabilitation of the precious Dobie pictured here, "BRANDY," with her new owner.

Brandy had been turned in to the South Central L.A. pound by her previous owner, and Dobie Rescue purchased her there a few days later. According to shelter policy, she had to be left for spaying by a veterinarian of their choice. When we arrived to pick her up at the vet's office, he said that when he opened her for her spay surgery, he found that she had previously been spayed, but before sewing her back up he noticed a rather large growth in her abdomen.

Because an appointment had already been made to show Brandy to the Yates family that afternoon, we kept the appointment and told the potential new owners about Brandy's tumor. They sincerely wanted to adopt her immediately and take care of her medical condition. We committed to paying half of her additional vet costs for whatever was involved.

It turned out that Brandy's whole abdomen was full of contusions, major masses which probably would have killed her if left unattended. The surgery to repair her left her very sick and weak for many weeks, but she survived it, thanks to the Yates' emotional and financial commitment to their pet, and thanks to your donations. Brandy's surgery was expensive, but we all agree that Brandy is well worth it.


