In our last issue, we identified our cover girl as



seems to be a good all-around guy. He's a 3 1/2-year-old blue Dobie who seems to like other dogs



and kids, and he's said to be housebroken. If a dog can be encouraged to play with another dog, Truman is the guy who can make it happen. One on one with new humans, Truman may need a week or two to bond, trust, and enjoy a new family, but we're pretty sure he'll be a winner in the right home.

KIRA

is quite a lovable big red girl who will fiercely

protect her human, though she's dog-social enough to let a large male dog eat her food. We've never observed her behavior with kids, but she'd probably do best in an adult home. Kira has been with us over a year! She's 5-6 years old now and a really easy keeper.



JASPER

is on the small side, a puppyish Dobie boy in his behavior, though he's probably about 3 years old. He's playful and dog-social with large female dogs and probably ok with older kids. Jasper came to us with an old, healed



fracture in a front leg that his previous owner didn't fix. Our vet says that it doesn't seem to bother him but that meds can help later in life if necessary. He uses all four legs but might not be the ideal long-haul jogging companion.

CHICKADEE,

our adorable Chihuahua mix, is being featured for the second time in Dobie Doings, the first being in



the fall, 2016 issue. She has been with us for almost a year, a whole year she could have been enjoying a new owner, and vice versa. We don't understand why she hasn't been adopted! Chickadee is about 6 years old, weighs 10 pounds, is social with dog

companions and probably kids as well. And she's snuggly.

LANCE

is a large red male Dobie who hasn't presented himself well for introductions because he's shy and a

little insecure. He has been with us about 6 months, he's about 3 years old, and he's been comfortable with all of the large female dogs he has bunked with during that time. We'd love to see him blossom in a pleasant home environment.

NO LONGER FORGOTTEN

As most of our readers know, several months ago we started something called The Forgotten Dog Project, which features outings for dogs that have been with us a long time, not only to give them an enjoyable, different type of day from their usual days, but also to capture their joy and share it on our web site so that potential adopters may feel motivated to adopt one of them.

Thus far over a dozen dogs have enjoyed outings like these, going to the beach, on trail hikes, etc., and three have been adopted! These are the lucky dogs:

SCOUT

spent an incredible six years waiting for the home he finally got, with Ned and KC Meislin, in upscale Manhattan Beach, no less!

Scout was turned in to the animal shelter in Lake Isabella during the summer of 2011 because he wasn't "a ranch dog." His owners said he couldn't live with chickens or cows. We didn't think that was too difficult to avoid when placing him, but he also turned out to not be dog-social in our environment, plus he had consistently goopy eyes, which turned out to be "dry-eye" in both eyes, requiring daily medication.

He was also a classic "plain brown wrapper" dog; i.e., not gorgeous, not a youngster, and not exuberant enough to draw adopters' attention. The high point of his day here at the rescue was mealtime. He was otherwise calm and quiet, not barking at the other dogs, laying calmly on his dog bed.

So when Ned called to inquire about another deserving dog who was least likely to be adopted,

Scout came to mind.

He lived 4 ½ more
years with them;
unquestionably the best
years of his life.



Scout is enjoying his new life, a LOT. From several of Ned's texts: "Oh he seems to love us. Likes people. Not dogs however. Appears to be afraid of them. Will not approach another dog but will growl if one comes up to him. Been walking him in the (early) morning without a leash. He stops and comes when I call him. Going to start running him with the bicycle soon. I'm pretty sure he likes it here."

JESSE,

a dog we always knew was a good dog that never seemed to get adopted, was adopted by Debby Kaplan of Los Angeles. She has adopted a number of dogs from us over the years, and her main concern was that her new Dobie would be social with the little Chihuahua



mix she adopted here a couple of years ago. We suggested Jesse, and he has not disappointed.

From Debby's e-mail: "He's the first dog I've adopted whose personality is just about the same as the day I brought him home...a great big slice of wonderful. No surprises with him. He's friendly, outgoing, and a really quick learner. He likes all people and most other dogs. And even with Jesse's friendliness, he's a really good watchdog.

He displays a lot of puppy behavior such as tossing his toys in the air and catching them, and chasing birds in the yard for 20 minutes at a clip. He plays with little Aggie until she goes under the patio furniture to get away from him, but she'll go lay on the dog bed with him every time!

I am grateful to have Jesse in my life...I am just mystified why no one wanted him. Lucky me! Deep thanks to you and all the volunteers at Dobies and Little Paws for the work you do. Jesse has made me so happy and I'm so glad to make his life comfortable and happy too."

CAPRI

had at least two homes before being adopted by Mary and David Johnson of Avondale, Arizona.

We had placed her once previously after rescuing her from an animal shelter, but it turned out that environment was too stressful for this sensitive dog.

A recent e-mail from Mary and David: "During the stress of adjusting to her new home Capri had some skin issues associated with color dilution alopecia. We started her on a grain-free diet and a vitamin regimen which has allowed her coat to come back nicely. Most mornings she wakes me by

putting her front paws on my bed. She plays with Titan, wrestling all over the house. She enjoys her morning walk. It is sad that Capri doesn't really know how to interact on a playful level with people, but we are hoping as we continue to love and interact she will learn to play. Thanks for all you do for the dogs and the breed"



NEW RULES FOR MISBEHAVIOR

New laws were recently passed that are severely, and often unjustly, punishing for dogs that

misbehave. Dogs that injure any other animal or a person can now fall under the supervision of the Critical Case Unit in Los Angeles County and similar units, we assume, in other counties.

A couple of these dogs came to our attention recently; one we were able to save, the other not. The first had been involved in injuring a goat, with the assistance of another dog. By proving that our rescue foundation has more than the \$300,000 of liability insurance required to rescue such dogs, committing to ten hours of intensive training, muzzling the dog when off the property, and ensuring that anyone who adopts the dog within three years follows the same requirements, we were able to save her.

The second dog, a beautiful young Dobie girl who was running loose with two pit bulls, injured a Chihuahua mix, also running loose. The Dobie's owner didn't want to get the insurance or meet the other requirements, so the dog, Morena, was surrendered to an animal shelter in Los Angeles County. Though we agreed to all the requirements that we had for the first dog, and though the Chihuahua mix survived, we were denied the ability to rescue her by our own county agency, Ventura County Animal Services. Morena was euthanized.

This is mentioned because dog owners now need to be more careful than ever to make sure their dogs are always securely confined, either in their own yards, or on leash with their owners in


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control, so that none of you ever have to face this horrific new protocol. Even if the dog has been adopted from us – and we always take our dogs back – this may not be possible going forward if Ventura County forbids it.

In our summer, 2015 newsletter, we printed a story about a Dobie named Major that we had rescued from an L. A. County animal shelter close to the one we were not permitted to rescue Morena from. Major had bitten someone and spent his 10-day quarantine hold at the shelter before we rescued him, and we had him for quite a few months before he got a great home, thanks to folks willing to take a chance based on our glowing recommendations about him. They subsequently

have said many times that if Major bit someone, they must have deserved it. In March of this year, an e-mail came from them that said, in part: "He is quite literally the best dog we have ever had. A perfectly lovely part of the family."



VIRTUAL ADOPTION RENEWED

Keep an eye on our website because we will be relaunching our "virtual adoption" program really soon. For so many different reasons, we have dogs that aren't candidates for adoption or who have been with us for years with no adoption prospects in sight. We have committed to caring for our "forgotten dogs" for the rest of their lives but we need a little help to be able to financially support them.
